Informal gathering spaces outside of your home ("First Place") & work ("Second Place") where you connect with others.

#### WHAT ARE THIRD PLACES?

Physical locations which strengthen social connections, build community, promote informal gathering, and contribute to the local economic "ecosystem."

- theaters
- parks
- community centers
- libraries
- museums
- retail establishments
- cafes/restaurants
- bars
- salons/barber shops

...and more!

#### ELIGIBLE THIRD PLACES

## PROPERTIES MUST BE RURALLY LOCATED

Defined as a population of less than 50,000 according to the 2010 census

# PROPERTIES MUST BE LISTED ON THE NATIONAL REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES

Either individually or as part of a district or become listed by the conclusion of the grant project. (Contact: Michael Houser)



# ELIGIBLE EXPENSES

- Construction costs related to exterior or interior property improvements;
- Property acquisition (a professional appraisal must be submitted with the application to establish fair market value);
- Architectural or engineering plans related to construction costs may be <u>up to 20%</u> of total project costs;
- Costs of submitting a National Register nomination to DAHP; and
- Accounting and legal fees related to easement preparation.




#### HISTORIC PRESERVATION

### ALL WORK MUST FOLLOW HISTORIC STANDARDS

- Retain as much historic character and original materials as possible
- Repair materials before replacing them
- Replacement materials must match historic materials
- New features must be compatible with the historic character
- We are here to help!



#### HISTORIC PRESERVATION



## A PRESERVATION AGREEMENT OR PROPERTY EASEMENT IS REQUIRED

- Agreement will be 5, 10, or 15 years depending on amount of funding
- All work done to the property during that time will need to continue to follow historic standards and be approved by DAHP
- Easements carry forward to new owners during the established timeline
- New features and/or additions may be allowed, but must be compatible with (and secondary to) the historic character

#### **GRANT AMOUNT**

- Applicants may request a maximum of \$75,000
- Applicants must provide at least 25% of overall project cost as match (1:3 ratio; may include in-kind donations)

To request the maximum grant amount: \$75,000 in grant funds

+ \$25,000 in match (at least)

\$100,000 in total project costs (at least)



#### **GRANT AMOUNT**

- Applicants may request a maximum of \$75,000
- Applicants must provide at least 25% of overall project cost as match (1:3 ratio; may include in-kind donations)

Other amounts must follow same ratio:

\$30,000 in grant funds

+ \$10,000 in match (at least)

\$40,000 in total project costs (at least)





#### FEDERAL STANDARDS


- Cannot use match or expenditures prior to the grant contract period of performance
- Must provide proof of liability insurance
- Must seek competitive bids for work over certain amounts
- Must use prevailing wage
- Cannot traffic humans



#### GRANT CRITERIA


- Community impact of the Third Place
- Community impact of the project
- Degree to which place/project demonstrates a commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion
- Applicant's readiness to proceed/ability to execute project
- Urgency of the project
- General quality/completeness of the submitted application
- Extent to which the project contributes to the geographic distribution of funds


#### APPLICATION WALKTHROUGH



- Applications must be submitted online
- Upload attachments where indicated (refer to attachment checklist)
- Must use program budget spreadsheet

#### APPLICATION ATTACHMENT CHECKLIST Be sure to have all of the following attachments ready to upload into the application form before you plan to finalize your submission. Step 1 of 7 1A.
