## Main Street districts show resiliency in rebounding from the COVID-19 pandemic

In 2022, the Washington State Main Street Program published a new study prepared by Jon Stover & Associates, which found that Main Street businesses rebounded from the pandemic at a faster rate than other areas without Main Street organizations.



 By the fall of 2021, businesses' sales in Main Street districts were 18% higher than their sales pre-pandemic, a greater rebound than businesses in similar districts without a Main Street organization and the state average.
