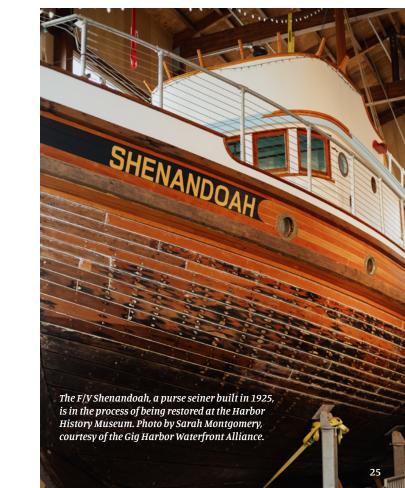


Washington's Master Craftsmen in Building Envelope Restoration

G1. UNREINFORCED MASONRY BUILDINGS ON MAIN STREET: SURVEYS, CODES, AND **INCENTIVES**

The Club @ the Boatyard (Gig Harbor Marina & Boatyard)

Unreinforced Masonry Buildings (URMs) pose significant risks to the economic stability and safety of Main Street communities across Washington. This session explores how historic preservation and disaster resilience intersect to identify and retrofit URMs. Representatives from the Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation and Washington State Military Department's Emergency Management Division will discuss survey efforts in Everett and Tacoma, training resources, and the upcoming URM online dashboard for property owners and city officials. Staff from the City of Seattle Department of Construction and Inspections will also cover the city's URM Retrofit legislation and financial incentives to support retrofits. Learn how communities can use these tools to reduce seismic risks while preserving their historic character.

This session brings together experts to guide attendees through the essential steps of historic vessel maintenance and restoration, including assessing historical and structural needs, selecting appropriate materials, assembling a skilled team, and securing funding. Panelists will share insights from real-world projects, offering practical strategies for successful preservation. and gain actionable advice for their own maritime preservation efforts.

G3. CREATING COMMUNITIES BY INCLUDING HOUSING IN HISTORIC PRESERVATION

Housing has become a headline-grabbing need in communities statewide. Centering the priority of creating community with the introduction or expansion of housing in historic places is a meaningful way to create greater community commitment. New housing means new residents who will enjoy maintaining local history while simultaneously expanding the economic vitality of their neighborhood. Rehabilitating existing buildings to include housing also reduces many of the environmental impacts introduced through demolition and wholesale new construction, thus minimizing negative consequences for existing businesses and residents. Speakers will share development practicalities and outcomes associated within their historic projects!

This session features Bellingham with speakers from the City and Downtown Bellingham Partnership along with community stakeholders working to build communities that include housing along with historic preservation.

Through a data deep-dive and interactive brainstorming, participants will explore significant barriers faced by Main Street entrepreneurs including high-interest debt, eroded equity, and insufficient owner compensation—and learn how building ownership can provide much-needed stability in a challenging business landscape. Using South Tacoma as a case study, stakeholders will discover methods of using local data to assess ownership trends in their areas. The session will conclude with a brainstorming session on actionable strategies to help entrepreneurs build equity in the real estate assets they occupy.

I1. BRIDGING HISTORIC PRESERVATION AND COMMUNITY TRANSPORTATION NEEDS: CULTURAL RESOURCE REPORTING ON FEDERALLY-FUNDED BRIDGE PROJECTS

With our state's vast number of waterways, bridges are ubiquitous throughout Washington. But aging structures coupled with growing populations and increased traffic are contributing to an increased number of bridge replacement, repair, or enhancement projects, often along vital transportation routes. While basic infrastructure is important to communities, so too is retaining the cultural heritage and sense of place created by historic bridges. In this session, we will discuss three Section 106 projects focused on bridges, underscoring how historical and cultural contexts can change cultural resource survey approaches. 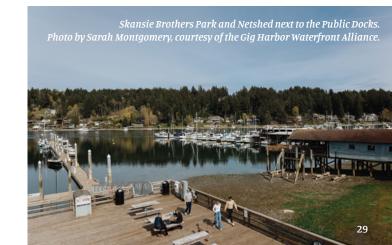

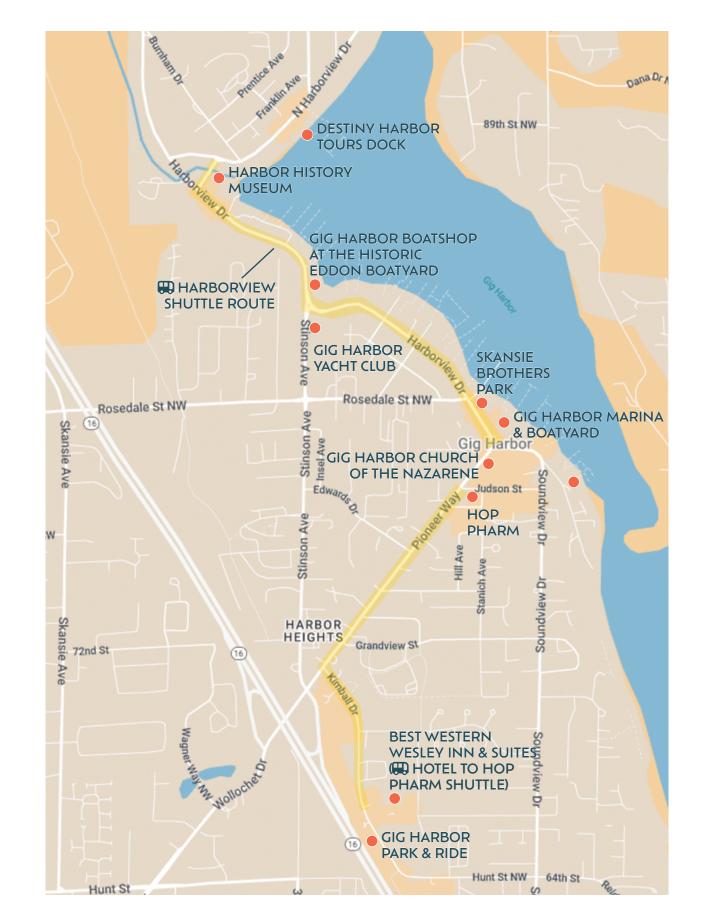
